Ending preventable maternal mortality (EPMM): a renewed focus for improving maternal and newborn health and well-being (WHO 2021)	In 2020, EPMM, co-chaired by World Health Organization (WHO) and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), and partners renewed focus on working with countries to accelerate progress towards improving maternal survival and wellbeing. In October 2021, EPMM launched coverage targets and milestones for 2025. EPMM closely collaborates with Every Newborn Action Plan (ENAP) in rolling out the activities at national, regional, and global levels.	Ending preventable maternal mortality (EPMM)	
Every Newborn: an action plan to end preventable deaths (WHO 2014)	The Every Newborn Action Plan (ENAP), endorsed in 2014, sets global and country goals and targets for ending preventable neonatal mortality and reducing stillbirth rates. ENAP implementation is overseen by global committees and cochaired by WHO and UNICEF. A results framework with milestones, objectives, activities, and timelines has been jointly developed by partners and endorsed by the ENAP Management committee. The ENAP and EPMM groups have identified joint priority countries and have developed a common results framework to guide implementation.	Every Newborn Action Plan	





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Trends in maternal mortality 2000 to 2020: estimates by WHO, UNICEF, UNFPA, World Bank Group and UNDESA/Population Division (WHO 2023)	The United Nations Maternal Mortality Estimation Inter-Agency Group (MMEIG)—comprising WHO, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), UNFPA, the World Bank Group, and the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA)/Population Division—collaborated with external technical experts on a new round of estimates covering 2000 to 2020. The estimates represent the most up-to-date MMEIG estimates of maternal mortality, using refined input data and methods from previous rounds. The report presents internationally comparable global, regional, and country-level estimates and trends for maternal mortality.	Trends in maternal mortality 2000 to 2020	
UN Inter-agency Group for Child Mortality Estimation (UN IGME)	UN IGME was formed in 2004 to share data on child mortality, improve methods for child mortality estimation, report on progress towards child survival goals, and enhance country capacity to produce timely and properly assessed estimates of child mortality. UN IGME updates its child mortality estimates annually after reviewing newly available data and assessing data quality. The web portal contains the latest UN IGME estimates of child mortality at the country, regional, and global levels.	Child Mortality Estimates	
Randomized Trial of Early Detection and Treatment of Postpartum Hemorrhage (The New England Journal of Medicine, 2023)	The E-MOTIVE trial, recently published in <i>The New England Journal of Medicine</i> , is a three-year, multicountry, randomized trial that involved training and equipping health providers to rapidly respond to postpartum hemorrhage (bleeding) using a low-cost plastic drape to collect and measure blood loss and a bundle of first-response treatments, including uterine massage, oxytocic drugs, and tranexamic acid. E-MOTIVE showed impressive results—that the bundle could reduce heavy postpartum bleeding by 60% and the rate of maternal death due to postpartum bleeding by 20%. The trial's results made headlines around the globe and was described as "game-changing" in its potential to significantly reduce deaths from postpartum hemorrhage. Improving the quality of care for maternal, newborn and child health: Implementation guide for national, district and facility levels (WHO, 2022)	Launched by WHO in September 2022, this implementation guide is a "living document," developed from implementation experience from the 10 countries in the Network to Improve the Quality of Care for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health (MNCH) and from implementing and technical partners in support of that work. This document contains practical guidance for policymakers, program managers, health practitioners, and other actors working to establish and implement quality-of-care programs at national, district, and facility levels. It is intended to help anyone, throughout the health system, who wants to take action to improve the quality of maternal, newborn, and child care.	Quality of care implementation guide	
Standards for improving the quality of care for small and sick newborns in health facilities (WHO, 2020)	Launched by WHO in September 2020, these standards built on the 2016 Maternal and Newborn Health QOC standards that focused on quality of Essential Newborn Care, newborn resuscitation, and postnatal care. These standards provide guidance for policy-makers, health program managers, professional bodies, and health care providers to establish services that are evidence based and of high quality so that newborns not only survive, but also thrive. Model for scaling up care for small and/or sick newborns at district level (Journal of Global Health, 2023)	The model of small and/or sick newborn care incorporates both the content of care (what care should be provided to small and/or sick newborns) and 10 core components for scaling up care for small and/or sick newborn care at the district level. The model builds upon a strong foundation of quality maternal care and essential newborn care. While emphasizing the fundamentals of periconceptional, antenatal, and intrapartum care, special newborn care also implies coordinated delivery of maternal interventions that are primarily directed at the health of the fetus/newborn, such as antenatal corticosteroids for threatened preterm birth and timely caesarean-section delivery for maternal or fetal indications.
